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Independent Auditor's Report

To Board Members of Partners for Children & Families, Inc. Carthage, North Carolina

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of Partners for Children & Families, Inc., which comprise the Statement of Receipts, Expenditures, and Net Assets - Modified Cash Basis as of and for the year ended June 30, 2023, and the related Statement of Functional Expenditures - Modified Cash Basis for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the Statement of Receipts, Expenditures and Net Assets - Modified Cash Basis of the Partners for Children & Families, Inc. as of and for the year ended June 30, 2023, and the Statement of Functional Expenditures - Modified Cash Basis for the year then ended in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting described in Note 1.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAS") and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of Partners for Children & Families, Inc., and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Emphasis of Matter - Basis of Accounting

We draw attention to Note 1 of the financial statements, which describes the basis of accounting. The financial statements are prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting, which is a basis of accounting other than accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America. Our opinion is not modified with respect to this matter.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with the modified cash basis of accounting described in Note 1, and for determining that the modified cash basis of accounting is an acceptable basis for the preparation of the financial statements in the circumstances. Management is also responsible for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.



In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Partners for Children & Families, Inc.'s ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS and Government Auditing Standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit
 procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of
 expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Partners for Children & Families, Inc.'s
 internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about Partners for Children & Families, Inc.'s ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings, and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.



Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The accompanying supplementary information in Schedule 2 on page 20 and Schedule 5 on page 23 is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by the North Carolina Office of the State Auditor, and is not a required part of the financial statements. In accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, we have applied certain limited procedures, which consisted principally of inquiries of management regarding the methods of measurement and presentation of the required supplementary information. However, we did not audit the information and express no opinion or provide any assurance on Schedules 2 and 5.

The accompanying supplementary information in Schedules 1, 3, and 4 on pages 19, 21, and 22 is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by Government Auditing Standards

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated January 24, 2024, on our consideration of Partners for Children & Families, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of Partners for Children & Families, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering Partners for Children & Families, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

NOTE 1 - SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

- A. Organization and Purpose Partners for Children & Families, Inc. (the Moore County Partnership) is a legally separate nonprofit organization incorporated on August 8, 1994. The Moore County Partnership was established to develop and provide, through public and private means, early childhood education and developmental services for children and families. The Moore County Partnership is tax-exempt as an organization described in Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code.
- **B.** Basis of Presentation The accompanying financial statements present all funds for which the Moore County Partnership's Board of Directors is responsible. Pursuant to the provisions of Financial Accounting Standards Board's Accounting Standard for *Not-For-Profit Entities*, the accompanying financial statements present information according to two classes of net assets: without donor restrictions and with donor restrictions. Net assets without donor restrictions are the part of net assets not subject to donor-imposed restrictions (donors include other types of contributors, including makers of certain grants). Net assets with donor restrictions are the part of net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions. As permitted by this Standard, contributions with donor restrictions received and expended in the same year are reported as receipts without donor restrictions rather than receipts with donor restrictions.

Contributions with donor restrictions that are not expended within the year received are reported as an increase in net assets with donor restrictions. When the restriction expires (that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished), net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the Statement of Receipts, Expenditures, and Net Assets - Modified Cash Basis as net assets released from restrictions.

C. Basis of Accounting - The accompanying financial statements were prepared on the modified cash basis of accounting. This basis differs from accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America primarily because it recognizes long lived assets and other costs which benefit more than one period as expended in the year purchased; it recognizes revenue when received rather than when earned; and it recognizes expenditures when paid rather than when incurred.

However, unexpended advances to contractors that revert back to the State of North Carolina are recognized as a reduction to expenditures and an increase to net assets. In addition, amounts withheld from employee paychecks or other amounts received in an agency capacity are recorded as funds held for others. Additionally, Smart Start funds advanced to the Local

Partnership that are unexpended and unearned at year end are recorded as funds Due to the State.

- D. Cash and Cash Equivalents This classification appears on the Statement of Receipts, Expenditures, and Net Assets - Modified Cash Basis and includes all demand and savings accounts and certificates of deposit and other short-term investments with an original maturity of three months or less.
- **E. Due to State** The funding provided by the State of North Carolina for the Smart Start Initiative is funded on a cost-reimbursement basis. The money is earned to the extent of allowable costs incurred. Any unexpended funds as of June 30 are required to be reverted to The North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc. to be returned to the State of North Carolina.
- **F.** Funds Held for Others Funds Held for Others includes amounts received that are fiduciary in nature in which the Moore County Partnership acts in an agency capacity. For the year ended June 30, 2023, the Moore County Partnership was holding amounts withheld from employee paychecks to be paid for payroll taxes, retirement and life and health insurance premiums in the amount of \$7.817.
- G. Property and Equipment Under the modified cash basis of accounting, purchases of property and equipment are reported as expenditures in the year incurred. However, the Moore County Partnership is required by contract regulation to track and maintain property and equipment items as presented in Schedule 4 of this report. The Moore County Partnership has a policy to track purchases of property and equipment items with an individual cost of \$500 or more and an estimated useful life greater than one year. Such items are valued at their original purchase price, which may be different from their valuation as of June 30, 2023. Donated items are recorded on the property and equipment log at estimated fair market value at the date of donation, which is defined as the price that would be paid to acquire an asset with equivalent service capacity in an orderly market transaction at the acquisition date.
- H. Compensated Absences As a result of the use of the modified cash basis of accounting, liabilities related to accrued compensated absences are not recorded in the financial statements. Expenditures related to compensated absences are recorded when paid. The amount of accrued compensated absences for accumulated, unpaid leave that would be due to employees upon termination is reported as a commitment in Note 9.
- I. Use of Estimates The preparation of financial statements in conformity with the modified cash basis of accounting used by the Moore County Partnership requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures (such as allocation of joint costs); accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates. It is management's belief that these estimates are reasonable and fair.
- J. Qualifying Match and Contributions of Financial and Nonfinancial Assets The Moore County Partnership, in accordance with applicable

Smart Start legislation, reports qualifying match provided at both the Partnership and the contractor level; the qualifying match is reported in supplemental Schedule 5. The match includes contributions of cash and other financial assets, and nonfinancial assets. Contributions of cash and other financial assets, received and expended at the Partnership level, are recognized as revenue when they are received and as expenditures when they are paid and are included in the modified cash basis financial statements. For valuation of contributions of other financial assets and nonfinancial assets, the Moore County Partnership utilizes fair value on the date of the gift. Nonfinancial assets could be donated equipment, supplies, office space, or services. The Moore County Partnership also benefits from donor volunteer hours which do not require special expertise, but which are nonetheless central to the Moore County Partnership's operations. During the vear ended June 30, 2023, the Moore County Partnership did not receive any contributions of other financial assets. Under the modified cash basis of accounting, the qualifying match reported on Schedule 5 for cash provided at the contractor level and for donated assets and services at both the Partnership and contractor levels is not recorded. See supplemental Schedule 5 for more information on the contributions of nonfinancial assets.

NOTE 2 - DEPOSITS

All funds of the Moore County Partnership are deposited with commercial banks and insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation (FDIC) up to \$250,000 per bank.

Deposits over insured amounts subjects the Moore County Partnership to a concentration of credit risk. At June 30, 2023, the Moore County Partnership did not have any bank deposits not insured by FDIC.

NOTE 3 - FUNDING FROM GRANT AWARDS AND CONTRACTS

Smart Start Program - The Moore County Partnership's major source of revenue and support is from the State of North Carolina based on cost-reimbursement contracts with The North Carolina Partnership for Children, Inc. (NCPC) for the Smart Start program. A significant reduction in the level of funding from the State could have an adverse effect on the operations of the Moore County Partnership and represents a concentration of credit risk as to the generation of revenue.

Associated with these contracts, the Moore County Partnership is responsible for developing a comprehensive, collaborative, long-range plan of services to children and families for the service-delivery area. During the year, the North Carolina Division of Child Development and Early Education (DCDEE) entered into contracts with and made payments to service providers selected by the Moore County Partnership. These service provider contracts are not reflected on the accompanying financial statements. However, a summary of the service provider contracts entered into by DCDEE is presented on Schedule 2 accompanying the financial statements.

The Moore County Partnership was awarded and has received \$952,188 under a current year Smart Start contract with NCPC. The unexpended balance of this

contract is subject to reversion to the State. The Moore County Partnership refunded \$72,469 of this contract to the State based on financial status reports submitted to NCPC subsequent to June 30, 2023. The Moore County Partnership has also refunded \$6,837 in prior year contracts during the year ended June 30, 2023.

The Moore County Partnership expects to receive continued funding through new Smart Start contracts with the State.

Dolly Parton Imagination Library Expansion Program - The Moore County Partnership was awarded \$12,000, received \$12,000, and expended \$7,304 under a current year Dolly Parton Imagination Library Expansion Grant (DPIL) with NCPC. As allowed by program regulation, the unexpended balance of the current year contract is available to carry forward to the subsequent year.

The Moore County Partnership does not expect to receive continued funding through new DPIL contracts with NCPC.

Child and Adult Care Food Program - Another major source of revenue and support for the Moore County Partnership was from the Child and Adult Care Food Program based on a cost-reimbursement contract. A significant reduction in the level of this funding could have an adverse effect on the operations of the Moore County Partnership and represents a concentration of credit risk as to the generation of revenue. The Moore County Partnership was awarded \$255,740, received \$218,330 and expended \$250,018 under a current year agreement. The Moore County Partnership also received \$114,212 and expended \$85,416 under a prior year agreement during the year ended June 30, 2023.

The Moore County Partnership expects to receive continued funding from the Child and Adult Care Food Program.

Child Care Referral Program - The Moore County Partnership was awarded, received and expended \$29,399 in federal funds which passed through from the Cumberland County Partnership for Children, Inc. to support childcare referral services. The Moore County Partnership also received \$6,302 under a prior year agreement during the year ended June 30, 2023.

The Moore County Partnership expects to receive continued funding from the Partnership for Children of Cumberland County, Inc.

Farm to Child Care Collaborations Program - The Moore County Partnership received revenue and support from North Carolina State University under the Strengthening Food & Agriculture Value Chains in North Carolina Through Farm to Child Care Collaborations program through a grant award with a term of October 31, 2021 through October 30, 2023. The Moore County Partnership received \$25,676 and expended \$28,328 in federal funds to help unite licensed childcare facilities with local farms to create and maintain a local food procurement process.

The Moore County Partnership does not expect to receive continued funding under this award from North Carolina State University.

Local Data-Informed Strategic Planning Micro Grant - The Moore County Partnership received \$3,000 in federal funds which passed through the James B. Hunt, Jr. Institute for Educational Leadership and Policy Foundation, Inc., as a participant in the Local Data-Informed Strategic Planning Preschool Development Activity to support system building and strategic planning.

The Moore County Partnership does not expect to receive continued funding under this award from James B. Hunt, Jr. Institute for Educational Leadership and Policy Foundation, Inc.

NOTE 4 - RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

Service Provider Contracts with Board Member Organizations - The board members of the Moore County Partnership are representative of various organizations that benefit from actions taken by the Board. It is the policy of the Moore County Partnership that board members not be involved with decisions regarding organizations they represent. Schedule 2 identifies contracts entered into by DHHS with board member organizations for activities funded by the Moore County Partnership 's Smart Start allocation.

NOTE 5 - FUNCTIONAL EXPENDITURES

The costs of providing the various programs and activities have been summarized on a functional basis in the Statement of Receipts, Expenditures, and Net Assets - Modified Cash Basis. Also, the Statement of Functional Expenditures - Modified Cash Basis, provides detail of the functional costs by their natural classification. Following are the services associated with the functional categories presented in the accompanying financial statements and the methods utilized to allocate joint cost:

A. Program Functions

Child Care and Education Quality - Used to account for service activities including or associated with child care resource and referral, professional development, provider training, learning materials and teaching aids and curriculum enhancements.

Family Support - Used to account for service activities including or associated with ongoing parenting education, general family support, literacy projects, community systems building and public awareness.

Health and Safety - Used to account for service activities including or associated with child care health consultations.

NC Pre-K - Used to account for development and implementation of NC Pre-K prekindergarten program for four-year-olds. The goal is to provide quality prekindergarten services in order to enhance kindergarten readiness.

B. Support Functions

Fundraising - Expenditures that are incurred in inducing others to contribute money, securities, time, materials, or facilities for which the contributor will receive no direct economic benefit.

Management and General - Expenditures that are not identifiable with a single program or fund-raising activity but are indispensable to the conduct of those activities and to an organization's existence, including expenditures for the overall direction of the organization, its general board activities, business management, general recordkeeping, budgeting, and related purposes.

Program Planning, Coordination and Evaluation - Expenditures that are incurred to coordinate the policies, procedures, and daily practices of service delivery. Also, costs associated with monitoring in-house and direct service provider activities as to the delivery of services and adherence to the specific terms and conditions of the contracts.

C. Allocation of Joint Costs

Expenditures benefiting more than one purpose were allocated as follows:

Salaries and Benefits - Direct allocation based on employee time reports.

Other Costs - Other costs including occupancy cost (rent, utilities and maintenance), supplies and materials, and communication costs (telephone and printing) were indirectly allocated based on estimates of utilization.

NOTE 6 - LEASE OBLIGATIONS

Rental expense for all operating leases during the year was \$60,000.

NOTE 7 - PENSION PLAN

IRC Section 403(b) Plan - All permanent employees who are at least half time can participate in a tax sheltered annuity plan (Plan) created under Internal Revenue Code Section 403(b). The employee's eligible contributions, made through salary reduction agreements, are exempt from federal and State income taxes until the annuity is received or the contributions are withdrawn. These Plans are exclusively for employees of universities and certain charitable and other nonprofit organizations. All costs of administering and funding these Plans

are the responsibility of the Plan participants. No costs were incurred by the Moore County Partnership.

NOTE 8 - RISK MANAGEMENT

The Moore County Partnership is exposed to various risks of loss related to torts, theft of, damage to, or destruction of assets; errors and omissions; injuries to employees; employees' health and life; and natural disasters. The Moore County Partnership manages these various risks of loss as follows:

Management believes such coverage is sufficient to preclude any significant losses to the Moore County Partnership. Settled claims have not exceeded this insurance coverage in any of the past three fiscal years.

NOTE 9 - COMMITMENTS AND CONTINGENCIES

Compensated Absences - As a result of the Moore County Partnership's use of the modified cash basis of accounting, accrued liabilities related to compensated absences (vacation only; sick leave does not vest) and any employer-related costs earned and unpaid, are not reflected in the financial statements. The compensated absences commitment for vacation leave at June 30, 2023 is \$12,986. No funds or reservation of net assets has been made for this commitment.

NOTE 10 - RESTRICTIONS ON NET ASSETS

A. Net Assets With Donor Restrictions - Net assets with donor restrictions at June 30, 2023 are restricted for the following purposes:

NOTE 11 - BOARD DESIGNATED FUNDS

Occasionally, the Moore County Partnership's Board designates a portion of financial assets for various programs. In the event of an unanticipated liquidity need, the Moore County Partnership's Board could use these designated financial assets to meet unanticipated liquidity needs. At June 30, 2023, the Moore County Partnership had Board designated funds of \$11,639.

NOTE 12 - FINANCIAL ASSETS AVAILABLE TO MEET CASH NEEDS

The following reflects the Moore County Partnership's financial assets as of June 30, 2023 reduced by amounts not available for general use because of contractual or donor-imposed restrictions within one year of June 30, 2023:

Financial assets available to meet cash needs for general expenditures

The Moore County Partnership is supported by contributions with donor restrictions. Because a donor's restriction requires resources to be used in a particular manner or in a future period, the Moore County Partnership must maintain sufficient resources to meet these responsibilities to its donors. Thus, financial assets may not be available for general expenditures within one year.

As part of the Moore County Partnership's liquidity management, a policy has been developed to ensure that sufficient resources are available to meet these obligations. In the event of an unanticipated liquidity need, the Moore County Partnership has a \$10,000 line of credit with Truist Bank or may draw upon the board designated funds. As of June 30, 2023, no amount is outstanding on the line of credit.

NOTE 13 - INCOME TAXES

within one year

The Moore County Partnership is exempt from payment of income taxes under the provision of Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code, except to the extent of taxes on any unrelated business income.

FASB ASC 740 provides guidance for how uncertain tax positions should be recognized, measured, presented and disclosed in the financial statements. FASB ASC 740 requires the evaluation of tax positions taken or expected to be taken in the course of preparing financial statements to determine whether the tax positions are "more-likely-than-not" to be sustained by the applicable tax authority. Management has analyzed the tax positions taken by the Surry Partnership and has concluded that, as of June 30, 2023, there are no uncertain tax positions taken or expected to be taken that would require recognition or disclosure in the financial statements.

Income tax returns for 2020 through 2022 remain open to examination by the tax authorities.

NOTE 14 - SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Moore County Partnership has evaluated events and transactions that occurred between June 30, 2023 and January 24, 2024, which is the date the financial statements were available to be issued, for possible recognition or disclosure in the financial statements. Events or transactions that provided evidence about conditions that did not exist at June 30, 2023 but arose before the financial statements were available to be issued have not been recognized in the financial statements for the year ended June 30, 2023.
